


A Read-to-Me Bible Story

from Genesis 1:1-25






Issue 2



Today your child learned about God's special creation of people. God wants us to

take good care of the bodies He made for us. Choose healthy snacks during the day and teach your children why they should try to eat foods that are good for them.

Children also need to be taught to value their bodies by getting enough sleep and exercising regularly. When it is too cold to play outside, play praise songs and exercise or dance together. Sing "Head and Shoulders, Knees and Toes" while motioning to the named body parts. Keep singing, speeding up each time, until you can't keep up any longer.



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Edible Dough

Use this recipe to make modeling dough. Sculpt some fun shapes and then eat them!

You will need

1/3 cup margarine, softened

1/3 cup light corn syrup

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1/4 teaspoon salt

food coloring (choose a color you like)

1 pound powdered sugar



- 1. Mix together the first five ingredients. Then add the powdered sugar.
- 2. Knead the dough until it is smooth.
- 3. Sculpt fun shapes. Eat them. (Don't forget to share some with your family and friends.)

The Bible tells us that people are more important to God than anything else He made. God sees and knows everything about each person. He even knows how many hairs are growing on your head!


We can praise God because He made people special.





Remember when your child discovered her hand for the first time? Those big

eyes realizing, as the hand moved, that it was attached. Children have a natural curiosity about the world. It is not long before sharp, young minds can begin to understand that God made each of us special.

Children soon notice differences in eye color, hair color, skin color, and so on. Take advantage of informal opportunities to talk about God the creator when children are exploring their world.

During the early years, you can have a significant impact on your child's appreciation of people and our wonderful creator. Look for times when you can reinforce your child's knowledge of God's presence, goodness, and power.

Moses Is Born What did the mother and sister

A Read-to-Me Bible Story

from Exodus 2:1-10

One day a mother put her baby boy in a basket-bed to hide him from the mean king of Egypt. The baby's mother and sister hid the basket in the tall river grass. The sister watched the basket. The basket could float. It would keep the baby safe.

An Egyptian princess and her helpers found the basket—and the baby! The princess asked the baby's sister to find someone to care for the baby. The sister ran and brought back her own mother!

The princess named the baby Moses. God cared for baby Moses, and God cares for us.


A Read-to-Me Bible Story


What a big, noisy parade it was as God's people marched out of the land of Egypt. God showed the people where to go. God was with Moses and the people. God is with us too.

We have all heard how important praise and encouragement

are to children. As children grow, they need to hear frequent positive messages from others to gain a balanced and healthy selfworth and to know what is right and good about the choices they make.

Sometimes being a good encourager takes practice. Try using these phrases with your children: "You can do it. I believe in you!" "You tried hard, and that is important." "Let's try that again—together." How refreshed we feel when someone comes alongside us and says positive words that motivate and encourage us in our choices. Let's commit ourselves to doing the same for our children.



Why were the people afraid?





Children usually believe that almost anything is possible for

them to do. They sometimes say "I can do it" when the task is actually beyond their physical capabilities. A child's enthusiasm to take on a difficult task might put the child at risk, but that same enthusiasm can also motivate the child to learn and accomplish great things.

What a wonderful moment it must have been for the Israelites to watch the waters of the Red Sea part! What seemed impossible to the people, God could do. God cared deeply for the people of Israel, and God cares for us too. Talk to your child about God's care and His power. Encourage your child to do all that he can with God's power working through him.




A Read-to-Me Bible Story





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Every child needs a place to feel safe and secure—

both physically and emotionally. Children must have their daily physical needs met—food, shelter, clothing. They need to feel safe physically from ghosts, darkness, and kidnapping. Children also need to feel safe emotionally from the rejection or belittling of others.

God recognized these same needs in the Israelites when He provided for their daily needs—meat and bread from the sky, water from a rock, and so forth. As you provide for your child's needs, rest assured that God will provide for your needs. Teach your child that she can trust you because you trust God.

A Read-to-Me Bible Story

from Exodus 19, 20, 24, 32

Moses was leading the people of Israel. God was ready to give His people some special rules to live by. Moses climbed a mountain. God told Moses what the people were to do to obey God.

Moses went down the mountain and told the people everything God had said. God's rules taught His people how to love God and other people.

Later, Moses went up the mountain again. This time God wrote His 10 rules on two flat stones. Now the people could read and remember God's rules forever.

Today your child learned that God gave to Moses

and His people 10 good rules to obey. Ask your child why God gave us rules. Talk about how God's rules help us remember that God is to be first in our lives. Obeying God's rules keeps us safe and happy.

Discuss the rules you have for your children. The rule about holding an adult's hand to cross the street is to keep your child safe. Rules about eating fruits and vegetables or taking vitamins are to keep the body healthy. Help your child understand that following rules is a good thing to do.


A Read-to-Me Bible Story from Numbers 13, 14

We know God is powerful. He will help us.





As a parent, you will need to help your children understand and grow in their ability to overcome fears. Recognize a child's fears no matter how silly or small those fears seem to you. Read stories of other children who have experienced similar fears.

The Bible talks about fear and reminds us that "perfect love takes away fear" (1 John 4:18). Love and encourage your children so that they become confident of God's love and care for them.

Find this verse in a family Bible. Make a door sign that includes the verse. Each time you walk through the door, recite the Bible verse.

This week, help your child remember:

God is powerful. He will help us.



Fear Not! Gather your family and talk about circumstances that make individual family members afraid—the dark, a storm, big dogs, and so forth. After each fear is named, draw a picture to illustrate the fear. Make a circle by holding hands, and place the pictures in the center of the circle. Say together, "We have the Lord. Don't be afraid." Read from the Bible, sing a praise song, and pray to demonstrate how God is with us when we are afraid.



A Read-to-Me Bible Story

from Joshua 1:1-11; 3:5-4:24

Joshua was to lead God's people into the land God had promised them. The people had to cross the Jordan River. Joshua told the priests to carry a special box into the river. When they did, the river stopped flowing. All the people could cross on dry land.

Joshua chose 12 leaders. Each man carried a large rock from the riverbed into the new land. The men set the stones in a big pile.

Whenever the people looked at the pile of rocks, they remembered how God had helped them. They knew God is powerful. He is with us.

Worship Rhyme

He is with us—me and you!



In the Old Testament, we can read of many moments of victory and

treasured assurances from God that were marked by piling stones as altars. The altars were testimonies of what God had done, both for the people of that time and for their children to come. The altars provided opportunities for the people to focus on God's greatness and love.

You may not celebrate around an altar as people did in Old Testament times, but it is important for your family to gather to give thanks for God's provision. You may want to set aside a special place in your home where your family can gather for prayer. Teach your children how to word simple prayers of praise to God.


